Speaking of the Fair, as the club voted on, we will be in charge of the gates. Brian Beringer is coordinating the work shifts for this. We will need lots of volunteers.



Sam guided the group through the collection's many fine specimens of petrified wood, fossils from around the world, exquisite gem and mineral specimens, and a fine looking meteorite.



On Wednesday, August 17th Joe Bost, will be leading a trip to the Old Butterfield Trail west of Massacre Peak. We will look for banded sandstone, jasper, chalcedony, and more. Meet at 8:00 a.m. at the Clubhouse and leave promptly at 8:15 a.m. High clearance, four-wheel drive vehicles are recommended since the drive to the site is rough. Finding Rock Hunting Maps on the Internet By Glen Miller

Here are some tips for locating free online maps (primarily USA). The good news is that there is a federal program that publishes digital products online that will provide complete national coverage. The bad news is that it is a federal program, subject to manpower and funding constraints, but it is a very good start. The Internet is a source for many maps of other countries. I have viewed geological maps of Oman and even the Moon and Mars online.

Geological and Geophysical Maps – Finding the map you need: Traditionally, one went to a state bookstore to purchase a paper map, hoping it was still in print. The trend today is to publish them online with free access. Tennessee will no longer be printing maps in advance. Maps that aren't online can be purchased for \$20 a map, printed straight from a digital file.

About.com - the quick and easy solution for links to state geological maps. About.com pre-searches and assembles all types and classes of information. If you go to their Geology or Maps sections and poke around, there are pages for state geological maps and state geological organizations. There is also geology.com with similar sources. They also list state authorities and links to their websites.

Once in those websites, you may frequently find a free downloadable map for the local area you are looking for. The USGS has taken great steps to centralize the search for geological maps.

SHOP STUFF

EDITOR'S NOTE: The source of these tips and hints are club bulletins and other sources. Be careful when trying out any new idea. They have not all been tried by this editor.

Cleaning with Acid – Handle with Care!

Cleaning Your Specimens: Wash to carefully remove dirt. If soaking in acids or other solutions, try an inferior specimen first. When working with acids, remember the three A's – Always add the Acid to the water. Keep your solution fairly clean for best results. Oxalic acid is useful for rust stains; muriatic acid, (dilute hydrochloric acid), for removing hematite stains; and hydrochloric acid is the best for removing black manganese stains. When using any of these solutions, wear protective clothing, goggles and rubber gloves. Household bleach works well for removing many stains but never mix bleach and acid. <u>The results could be</u> tragic. Always best to test on an unwanted sample.

• **Barite:** 30% hydrochloric acid solution.

- Beryl: Any acid solution may be used.
- Petrified Wood: Household bleach or oxalic acid.
- Bornite: Overnight in oxalic acid.
- Carbonated Minerals: If your specimen will not come clean in bleach, use a weak solution of oxalic acid.
- Chalcopyrite: Soak over night in a solution of oxalic acid, 2 oz. to a qt of water, or under close watch in hydrochloric acid.
- Copper: Nitric or hydrochloric acid.
- Epidote: Quick dip in nitric or sulphuric acid.
- Fluorite: Hydrochloric or muriatic acid, 1 part acid to 10 parts water.
- Galena: Soak overnight in oxalic acid. Wash well.
- Gold: Ammonium bifluoride.
- Graphite: Try any acid.
- Hornblende: (microline, scapolite, tourmaline): Any acid except hydrofluoric,
- Iron (labradorite): Concentrated sulphuric acid.
- Marcasite: Overnight in oxalic acid solution or a quick dip in hydrochloric acid, or it may be washed in ammonia water.
- Minerals: Hydrofluoric or sulphuric acid solution.
- Orthoclase: Most acids except aqua regia.
- **Pyrite:** Overnight in oxalic acid solution or a quick dip in hydrochloric acid. Rinse in ammonia water.
- Silver: 1 oz. baking soda, 1 oz. salt dissolved in 2 quarts warm water in an aluminum container.
- Sulphide minerals: Acetic acid solution. If this doesn't work, try hydrochloric acid. Source: Gems of the Rogue July 2011

Eleven Ways to Become a Fossil

Freezing - This rare creature has suffered a minimum of change. His arteries may still contain dried blood, his stomach undigested food. Most common is the lce Age mammoth of Siberia and Alaska.

Drying or Desiccation - If these organisms were thoroughly dried, they can be of high quality. Best known are the camels and sloth found in our Southwest caves.

Wax and Asphalt - Natural paraffin makes an excellent preservative, as proved by specimens found in Polish mines. The most famous asphalt fossils are still embedded in the La Brea Tar Pits in California.

Simple Burial - English bogs are famous for their buried forest. Sand dollars, sea urchins, and mollusks have been preserved by this method for up to 75 million years.

Carbonization - Incomplete decay of volatile substances leaves carbon behind, sometimes reducing organisms to paper thin layers of shiny black film that reveal much detail.

Petrification - Our common stony fossils got that way by premineralization, the replacement of the structure by dissolved minerals, or secondary replacement, such as when lime fossils are dissolved and replaced by silica.

Molds and Casts - Natural molds in sediment remain after organisms decay. Sandstone beds reveal molds of shells and trees, and the finest molds are Northern European amber, which has perfectly preserved the forms of insects.

Imprints - Sandstone, shale and tuff reveal external molds of very thin objects such as leaves. Best known of these are the Illinois Coal Age plant imprints.

Tracks, Trails, Burrows - Dinosaur prints are the most famous of these. But Nebraska's "Devil's Corkscrew" once housed a beaver who dug an eight foot spiral hole.

Castings and Coprolites - Ancient worms swallowed sand to help digest small organisms. They regurgitated these casings. Coprolite is a polite word for petrified "dung."

Gastroliths - Many ancient reptiles ground their food with these stones (as do our modern fowl). The stones are rounded, smooth, and even polished at times. Also known as Gizzard Stones ." *Source: Gems of the Rogue – July 2011*
