



A ROCKHOUND'S RAMBLINGS By Susan Young

DID YOU KNOW...

TALC is used in eye shadow, liquid make-up, rouge, blushes and pressed powders.

IRON OXIDES (magnetite, black oxide, hematite, red oxide, limonite, yellow oxide, geothite) are used in liquid makeup.

ZINC OXIDE is used in creams to protect skin from the sun.

MICA is used in eye shadows. If coated with rutile or anatase, it makes pearlescent shades of lipstick, eye shadow, hair gel, body lotion, rouge and blush.

CALCITE is a binder in eye shadow and pressed makeup, in chewing gum bases, antibiotics, antacids and dentrifices.

QUARTZ is used in scouring soaps and toothpaste, in coatings for pills and capsules and in ointments, suppositories and lotions.

Recycling the ROCKHOUND'S way:

Old toothbrushes can clean specimens and stones, polish hard-to-get spots; the handle can be a burnish tool or polish mixer.

Foam meat trays are good for sorting or for small displays.

Milk and juice cartons provide bulk storage on a field trip. Close lid to stack.

Plastic tubs are good for mixing, sorting, measuring or storing grit and findings.

Use old T-shirts for drying stones or for hand polishing.

Metal cans are good for storing rough or tumbled stones.

SUMMER ISN'T OVER YET...

When Rockhounding you need to watch out for snakes. They are still out and dangerous as ever...

Though seemingly rare, poisonous snakes annually bite 6.500 to 7,000 Americans. Always take the following precautions:

- 1. Always assume snakes are active. Do not relax your vigil on sunny Fall and Winter days.
- 2. Do not make "solo" trips across snake country which is remote from habitations and frequently used roads.
- 3. When traversing brush or grassy terrain, use a "decoy" such as a level rod or a lath, alongside your legs. Walk heavily to create vibrations that can be felt by snakes (a snake does not hear).
- 4. Walk away from the shaded side of clumps and bushes when the weather is hot and sunny.
- 5. Step on logs and large rocks, instead of stepping over them and into unseen areas. The safest policy is to walk around such obstacles.
- 6. Do not jump down from overhangs onto areas where snakes might be hidden from view.
- 7. Avoid steep climbs if possible where a snake, uphill from you, could strike the upper portions of your body. Bites on the torso, the neck, and the head are much more damaging and more difficult to treat than those on the limbs.
- 8. Never climb vertical or near vertical faces where handholds on unseen areas above your head are required.
- 9. Do not attempt, under any circumstances, to capture snakes!!
- 10. Do not try to kill a snake unless it is a positive threat to safety.
- 11. Avoid likely snake areas such as small rodent trails, pack rats' nests or gopher tortoise dens.
- 12. When necessary to move low-lying logs, large rocks and boards, use a pry bar, not your hands.
- 13. Double your precautions at night, especially in warm weather.
- 14. Keep vehicles near your work area for rapid transport if snakebite should occur.
- 15. If at all possible, maintain radio contact with isolated people in your group.
- 16. Know the location of the nearest medical facility where anti-venom is available and the quickest route there.
- 17. Do not collect rattles. A fine and highly abrasive dust often accumulates inside the rattles and can cause lasting damage to the eyes.
- 18. Wear high leather boots or snake-leggings in high hazard areas.
- 19. Remember that rattlesnakes do not always signal their presence by rattling.

ROCKHOUNDS ARE FUNNY

The price of a steak may dismay them, and they may often pass it by, then turn around and spend more per pound on a rock! A Rockhound can't eat the rock, but will proudly display it, dust it, brag about it and then saw it up and polish it to perfection.

Sunstone, a Precious Feldspar

When I read about the theft of one dealer's entire stock of a unique variety of sunstone (1,6,7), my curiosity was triggered as to what sunstone is and how it is formed. I found it is a member of the feldspar family. However, It is much more is involved than that.

FELDSPAR

'Feldspar' is the most common mineral, worldwide, followed by quartz. 'Feldspar' is the most common minerals in most igneous rocks, being the white, pink, gray (and many other color) mineral, usually opaque or translucent. Feldspars are all solid-solutions of several pure minerals, varying in composition over a wide range, or mixed microscopically small alternating volumes of different feldspars. They all have hardness in range of 6.5-7. Quartz is the glassy mineral in lighter colored igneous rocks, generally the last to form in to crystallize. Transparent feldspars are quite uncommon.

FELDSPARS ARE SILICATES

Quartz is a network silicate (formula SiO2) with all four oxygen atoms of a silicate tetrahedra [(SiO4)-4] shared with adjacent silicate tetrahedra in a three dimensional network, all charges satisfied by sharing. Feldspars as a family are network silicates with some of the silicate tetrahedra replaced by aluminate tetrahedra [(AlO4)-1] and the negative charge balanced by positive charges from metal ions to give aluminosilicates. There are several families of silicate minerals, all with different arrangements and bonding of silicate tetrahedra. These families of minerals must be subject of another article or articles. The Zeolites are a whole class of extremely complex aluminosilicates which would require *Books* to adequately describe.

SODIUM-CALCIUM FELDSPAR

The mineral formed by crystallization from magma depends on the ions present and their relative concentrations as well as crystallization conditions. Generally, a metal ion can substitute for another in a crystal lattice if their ionic radii are within fifteen percent of each other. Sodium and calcium ions are within the 15%, so a series of mixed feldspars called **Plagioclase** occur with any composition between pure sodium feldspar (**Albite**, NaAl-S3O8, shorthand 'Ab') and calcium feldspar (**Anorthite**, Cal2Si2O8, shorthand Al). Various feldspars between **Albite** to **Anorthite include Oligioclase**, **Andesine**, **Labradorite**, and **Bytownite**.

POTASSIUM FELDSPAR

Orthoclase is the pure potassium feldspar with a typical formula of KAlSi3O8. The higher temperature polymorph is **Sanidine**, while the lower temperature polymorph is **Microline**. Another formed in hydrothermal deposits is **Adularia**. The largest known Orthoclase crystals are about 10X10X0.4 meters and weigh ca. 100 tons, while the largest documented Microline crystal was 50X36X14 meters.

A MIXTURE OF POTASSIUM AND SODIUM FELDSPAR-SUNSTONE

Since the potassium ion is much larger than sodium ions (Na+1), a mixed sodium/potassium feldspar does not form. From magma containing proper combination of ions to seemingly give (K,Na) AlSi3O8, a solid forms which is alternating microscopically thin

lamella of the two minerals, KAlSi3O8 and NaAlSi3O8 called **SUNSTONE**. It has hardness of 6-7.2 and a vitreous luster. It comes in clear, yellow, red, green, blue and 'copper shiller'. The **OREGON SUNSTONE** is unique in having micro-flakes of metallic copper, in hexagonal, rhombic or irregular shape. The central part of the crystal is darker in color depending on concentration of copper, and as the crystal is turned there are reflections of light from the copper flakes, giving an effect known as 'schiller'. Oregon Sunstone is the Oregon State Gemstone.
