



## SHOP STUFF

EDITOR'S NOTE: The source of these tips and hints are club bulletins and other sources. Be careful when trying out any new idea. They have not all been tried by this editor.

# SAFETY RULES: Thought it would be a good idea for the new year to review some safety

- Jewelry making can be a most enjoyable hobby but there are certain hazards which must be avoided, and can be, by following a few simple rules.
- Work Safely. You can't get by on luck.
- Don't polish a wire or chain on a rotary tool without nailing the wire or chain to a board. This might wrap around the arbor and pull your hand with it.
- Don't set fire to your clothing with the torch. Fuzzy sweaters are dangerous.
- Don't drop the torch or fail to turn it off. An explosion might follow
- Don't pour water into acid when making pickle; pour acid into water.
- Don't turn over the pickle pot or the boil pot. Keep handles to the rear
- Don't put a large piece of very hot metal in pickle might splash.
- Don't pick up the charcoal block or hot metal until you are sure they are cool.
- Don't hold a piece being drilled with your hand; the drill might slip or break or the piece might spin when the drill breaks through. Use pliers.
- Don't put your fingers inside any item being polished, for example, a belt-buckle, a ring, a bracelet, etc.
- Hold the work being polished between finger-tips and thumb.
- Don't wear rubber gloves or fingerstalls when polishing; these might wrap around the arbor. Don't work without some protection for the eyes such as plastic goggles or a magnifying eye piece, particularly when using a rotating wire brush.
- Don't let your tie at hair get caught by the rotating arbor. This could be fatal.
- Don't get into contact with electricity or belts. Don't work on a wet or damp floor.
- Don't fail to report any apparent hazard immediately.
- We repeat: "Work safely. You can't get by on luck. Just fail to observe these rules and you will find your situation comparable to that of the fellow whose wife had the stone-cutter carve on his tombstone, "I told you to go to the doctor". Source: Gems of the Rogue February 2008

### **JUMP RINGS**

It's better to use a round jump ring on the end of a chain instead of an oval one. Oval rings will wear faster because tension on the chain concentrates wear on the smaller ends of the jump ring. Wear is distributed evenly on a round jump ring because it can rotate through the last link of the chain and the clasp. This gives the ring a longer useful life.

### **ORGANIZING SMALL PARTS**

With all the little components we use for our projects, it makes sense to have a good way to keep them organized and preventing them from getting lost. A great small container to use is available in numbers and for free at your local drugstore. Ask at the photo processing area for some of the 35mm plastic film cans. They have a tight fitting lid and are great for carrying beads, findings, jump rings, and silver scraps.

### STIFFENING EARRING POSTS

Soldering an earring post will always soften the wire a bit. Easiest way to harden it is to grip the end of the post with your flat-jaw pliers and twist it a couple half turns. This work-hardens the wire and at the same time tests your soldered joint.

### **USE A SPRAY BOTTLE**

Those little spray bottles you can find at the drug store are great for firescale preventors and debubbling solutions. A quick firescale preventor is liquid flux, and a homemade debubbling solution is a little Dawn liquid in rubbing alcohol.

### **BROKEN DRILLS**

Have you ever broken a drill bit off in a hole? Sometimes you can grab it with pliers, but other times the steel piece is below the surface in the hole. If this happens, you can usually dissolve the steel in a solution of alum. Alum is typically available from a food store or a drug store. Use about a teaspoon per cup of warm water. Submerge your piece so that the partially drilled hole is facing up so that bubbles can float free.

### **HOT TIP ON THUNDEREGGS**

Many lapidaries now heat nodule and thunder egg halves under a heat lamp for a few minutes, before polishing with tin oxide or cerium oxide on felt. The polish comes up almost instantly. Alternatives include putting specimens in a 200 degree oven until warm to the touch, or putting specimens in a kettle full of hot water until they are warm. Dry off excess water before polishing.

## Patina Using A Hard-Boiled Egg

I've demonstrated this popular non-toxic patina in my newsletter, workshops, and in my "Cool Tools and Hip Tips" column in *Lapidary Journal Jewelry Artist* magazine. All you need is a peeled warm hard-cooked egg, your piece, and a ziplock bag.

Put the warm egg and the piece in the bag, seal it tight, and let the bag sit on the countertop for a few hours. You'll get a gentle, subtle patina from the sulfur of the egg yolk. Throw the egg away once you've got a color you like. Again, seal your patina with Krylon or wax (Renaissance, Butchers, or floor wax all work well, and a tiny dab will protect a large pendant or brooch).

### Super Fine Jewelry Cleaner

Mix together 1/4 cup white vinegar, 1/4 cup household ammonia; 1/8 cup dish detergent (NOT DISHWASHER DETERGENT). Drop jewelry in. Rinse well and watch it shine. This is also good for copper bottom pans and silverware.

### **Polishing Talc**

The natives of Brazil have used the talc found there to make common utensils such as cooking appliances. Professional talc carvers from Anapolis-Goles, Brazil, showed me this quick method when they visited Houston, Texas, in a nation-wide tour.

- 1. CUT the talc into size desired with hand saw (even the pros didn't use any electric equipment except a lathe for hollowing out bowls and pots). Sometimes this step may be skipped if the piece is of the correct size.
- 2. CARVE the talc into approximate shape with a knife.
- 3. SAND with 220 or 400 grit sandpaper.
- 4. SMOOTH with quadruple zero (0000) steel wool, the finest available.
- 5. HEAT in strong sunlight or warm oven until slightly warm to the touch.
- 6. RUB with clear paste wax while the talc is still hot, and you have got yourself a finished carving.

Reasonably pure talc is required, but impurities give it a delightful marking or pattern. This method may be used for cabs, statues, or anything else. Thefinished product may surprise you, as you can't tell how it will turn out until the paste wax is on.

### PECOS "DIAMONDS"

Pecos "diamonds" are double-terminated quartz crystals from along the Pecos River for around 100 mile stretch from Carlsbad to beyond Roswell. They range in size from around 1mm or less to around 3/4" diameter by possibly 2" length. They range in color from colorless to black, with most being flesh and tans. Included are some carnelian, sard, sardonyx, etc. They occur as singles, twins, and multiples, clusters (many of which are very attractive 'rosettes'.), penetrates, etc. Pecos 'diamonds' weather out of gypsum

### **SUGILITE**

Sugilite is named after a Japanese geologist, Kenichi Sugi, who discovered the first tiny specimens in Japan in 1944. It is a rare ore, potassium sodium iron lithium silicate, ranging in color from pink to purple. The primary gem deposit was found in 1979 at the 3,200 ft. level in the Wessels Manganese Mine, 14 miles northwest of Hotazel, South Africa, in the Kalahari Desert.

Smaller deposits occur in Brazil and Canada. Sugilite usually occurs in pegmatites of alkaline magmas and crystallizes into opaque masses. It occasionally occurs as small crystals or inclusions within quartz, and very rarely, in a translucent gemmy form known as "gel". It is frequently found in combination with manganese [black streaks], Bustamite, a calcian variety of rhodonite [orange/brown areas], and sometimes with Richterite [blue].
