It's too hot, for those of you that don't know. Hopefully this is as hot as it will get this year, and the monsoons hurry up and start.



# Upcoming Field Trips

On Saturday, July 14th Ben & Barb Staff will lead the club to the Cedar Mountains area where we will look for the famous Baker Ranch "raisins" - the agate/chalcedony left over from a geode. We will also look for pink chalcedony. We will meet in front of the Clubhouse parking lot at 7:30 a.m. and depart at 8:00 a.m. sharp. Four-wheel drive vehicles are recommended, but not necessary.. A hat, sunglasses, sunscreen, plenty of water, and food are recommended.

In August, Wayne Treers will lead the club to the Massacre Peak area south of Cookes Peak to look for banded sandstone (picture rock). Four-wheel drive vehicles are strongly recommended. A hat, sunglasses, sunscreen, plenty of water, and food are also recommended. Date and time to be determined later.

## SWNM State Fair and the Club

Our Club has a long history of working with the Southwestern New Mexico State Fair Board.

For several years during the 1970's and 80's, and into the 1990's, Club members helped maintain the Fairgrounds, picking up trash, mowing lawns, and doing repairs. In exchange for this labor, the Roundup did not pay rent for Fairground use during the Roundup. The Club also was allowed to build a storage building on the Fairgrounds property and given a 99 year lease on its use. The Club was also awarded a Life membership in the Fair Association.

Through the mid 2000's, a Club member was designated as liaison to the Fair Board, attended Fair Board meetings, and reported to the Club. At some point the Club discontinued maintenance activities and began paying rent for the Roundup, and shortly after, stopped having a representative attend Fair Board meetings. Our rent for the Roundup week was \$1500 plus \$100 for utilities.

In 2008, the Fair Board raised our rent to \$2500 plus \$250 for utilities. As this would hurt the Club's ability to pay the bills and keep the members dues reasonable, and with the Boards knowledge, I attended a Fair Board meeting, pled our case, and succeeded in getting the rent reduced to \$2000 with no charge for utilities. In exchange, the Club agreed to set up booth partitions used during the Fair in building #1 and to take them down after the Fair.

In 2010, I attended a Fair Board meeting to confirm dates and rent agreement for the Roundup. When it was over, I was a duly elected member of the Fair Board.

In August of 2010, the organization that collected entry fees at the gates during the Fair ceased to do so. The Fair Board offered to trade rent & utilities free if the Club would man the gates. I presented this proposal to the August General meeting where a vote was taken and passed with no dissent.

Now, it sounds like I am blowing my own horn. That is not my intent. I just don't know how else I can provide background for the reason I am writing this message which is to appeal to each of you to step up to the plate and volunteer to help where needed to fulfill our obligation to the Fair Board.

The position that needs to be filled ASAP, is that of Committee chair. This entails soliciting club members to sign up to work the four entry gates during the Fair (Sept 25-30), to assign gate positions and work schedules, to adjust schedules and gate assignments as needed. Please call Jerry at 575-543-8915 if you can take on this position. For those of you who can fill a shift on one of the Fair gates, a sign up sheet is on the table at the Clubhouse or call me at the above number.

Jerry Abbey had some items to discuss as follows:


- 1) The Chips will be run on the 5th or 6th.

#### Common Myths About Diamonds

by Fred Cuellar, author of the best-selling book "How to Buy a Diamond"

- **1. A Diamond is Forever** A diamond will only be forever if you take care of it. If you don't a diamond can chip, fracture, or break. Even a diamond should come with a care instruction tag.
- 2. Diamonds are very rare Nope! There is more of a manmade shortage than a natural shortage. The distribution of the number of diamonds put on the market each year is highly regulated. There are really enough diamonds to give each man, woman and child in the United States a whole cupful.
- **3.** A Fancy Shaped Diamond is More Difficult to Cut than a Round Diamond All diamonds, to a certain degree, are difficult to cut, and some very large diamonds take more time and effort to cut than smaller diamonds do. But one diamond is not harder to cut than another just because of the shape.
- **4. Diamonds are a Good Investment -** Webster's dictionary defines investment as "an outlay of money for income or profit." Since most people purchase diamonds to be worn and not to be resold, diamonds are not a good investment. Only through proper education and training could diamonds become a good investment. For the average Joe, I would recommend buying a diamond for the enjoyment and prestige it brings and don't be too concerned about making a buck.
- **5.** A Diamond is the Most Expensive Gemstone The truth is there are quite a few more expensive gemstones on the market. For example, a top quality ruby can be worth over thirty thousand dollars a carat.
- **6.** A Jeweler will Tend to Mount His Best Diamonds in Ready to go Settings On the contrary, a jeweler will always pre-mount his worst diamonds in settings. That way he can hide any chips under prongs and make it impossible for you to get an exact color and weight measurement. Always remember a jeweler's best diamonds are in his safe and the only way to see them is to ask for them to be brought out.

#### Gemstone Dyeing

Mix a box of Rit dye with a couple of ounces of wood alcohol. Let your stones, polished or tumbled, soak in this solution in a small jar until the desired shade has been reached. This could take 30 minutes or overnight. If too much dye is absorbed, soak in clear wood alcohol. Slicing after being dyed can result in some fantastic results.

**Do You Wear a Baseball-type Cap** with the ventilated mesh crown? Next time buy an insulated model such as farmers wear. This cap has a foam lining that insulates against heat loss in winter and against heat penetration during the summer—but that's not its greatest advantage. By dipping the cap in water, and saturating the foam sponge lining with water, you create a simple air conditioner. Wring it out slightly before you put it on. As the water evaporates it has a refreshing cooling effect.

**Black petrified wood,** when polished has no resemblance to wood at all. It looks like a plain black polished stone. You can highlight some of the beautiful grain structure by bleaching it.

Soak the cut and sanded pieces in household bleach for 2 to 4 weeks, replenishing the solutions when needed. When the desired grain contrast has been obtained, remove the pieces, and polish. Some extremely interesting pieces can be obtained by this method.

#### Dangerous To Cut? by Vincent King

Introducing any foreign body into the lungs COULD be hazardous. Do not simply try to identify one set of stones as dangerous. Creating an inordinate amount of dust during the cutting process is always a bad idea. The Copper Gems, all inclusive, have their inherent dangers, heavy metal dangers, if you will. Use an adequate amount of water to assist in reducing dust. If you can taste it, you are breathing it. In addition, take into consideration, that Tigers Eye, Bulls Eye, and Hawks Eye are all of the Asbestos family. If you are serious about protecting your lungs through the use of a mask, don't waste your time and money on the single layer paper coffee filter type. They are good for keeping gnats out of the teeth, but that is about it. Look for some of the multi-layered masks designed to keep out fine particulate. These will be much thicker, have the padded nose piece to contour to the nose, and two elastic straps one that fits behind the base of the skull, the other over the back of the head. Getting the Darth Vader looking respirators will not only guarantee that you'll be particulate free, uncomfortable while gemmin', a whole bunch poorer. The only other benefit would be to scare the heck out of anyone that comes to visit while you are cutting. Cutting safely is as easy as using just a touch more water to control the dust.

Cannot say it enough, if you can taste it, you are breathing it! Happy cutting is NOT hazardous to your health!

**When cutting jade**, the more milky the water is the better grade of jade. If the water isn't milky, then you don't have true jade—you have something else.

Save the inner plastic ring from scotch tape rolls. They make great stands for spheres.

When working with a soft stone such as Onyx or Marble, soak it in water a couple of days before cutting. This will keep oil from soaking in to discolor the stone and will result in a higher polish.
