

#### WHAT IS DEODORANT STONE?

Made of potassium alum sulfate and oth-er mineral salts which are crystallized over a period of months. Called a natural body deodorant the Deodorant Stone actually inhibits bacterial growth on your body. This bacterial growth is what causes body odor. The fragrance-free mineral salts works only on the surface of the skin, and do not clog pores. It does not alter the body's ability to eliminate toxins.

To use as a deodorant, wet the stone and rub to underarms, much like you would a roll-on. Each stone will last many months. After use, rinse the stone in clean water and let dry.

#### **FAKES and FRAUDS**

Unfortunately, there is a growing amount of deception and outright fraud these days at gem and mineral shows and in some of the online venues that sell these items. Of-ten "genuine turquoise beads" turnout to be dyed magnesite, and I have been told that the majority of colored stones being sold typically have had some "enhancement" done to them. #### HINTS FOR SURFACE COLLECTING

- When searching for translucent material, like agate, walk towards the sun; you will see the sun shine through the stone.
- When looking for reflective material like crystals, have the sun behind you and the material will shine or sparkle in the sun.
- If you walk sideways to the sun, look side to side for both translucent and reflective material.
- If you find something good or unusual, stop and mark the spot, look up the slope and down the slope to find the source of the material. Some collectors like to pile rocks every time they find something unusual, that way they can see the fall-line of the material.

## First Aid Trip Tip

Never count on Band-Aids that get cooked in a car. I keep maybe 5-10 in a sandwich bag and I'm quick to replace them, especially before going rockhound-ing or on a long trip. Use cloth bandages (no adhesive) and gauze. I also keep a couple rolls of adhesive tape (cloth type) in the First aid kit. They last much longer than band aids when cooked in a car's heat. I figure they are good for a couple of seasons including summer. They may get sticky, but they'll still work.

Oh yeah, covering your fingertips with adhesive tape can help protect them from broken rock shards like quartz flakes.

#### **KNOW YOUR ROCKS**

**Leaverite**: Also known as Dropite, Junkite, and Crudite. This type of rock should be discarded immediately. It constitutes 90% ofmost rocks. This includes Sourgrape Agate and Mutilated Quartz.

**Sack Rock**: This is material that is stuffed into a sack but falls from the top as the bearer struggles back to the car. If taken home, it will be tossed into a corner and forgotten.

**Wonder Rock**: You always wonder why you brought it home and where you found it.

**Braggin" Rock**: Also called Pocket or Eating Rock. This material is licked, rubbed, spit upon, and fondled until it assumes a near polish and is frequently passed around for admiration.

@#\$%& Rock: A large, heavy, possibly angular rock that falls on your foot as soon as you have removed your hiking boots.

## New Test For Mineral Hardness!!!!

You're out in the mountains, near Tarry-All Creek. You see a sparkly clear crystal in the water and pull it out. How do you tell if it topaz and not quartz? Without using a quartz crystal to test the hardness?

Dry it off, wipe it clean with a cloth to remove all grease, and then drop a drop of water (that's right good H2O!) on it from an eyedropper or soda straw.

Watch the water bubble. On stones 7 or less in hardness, the water drop will disperse! On harder stones it will form a globule. The harder the stone, the bigger the globule!

The principle is called "cohesion." The water drop "pulls" together on a hard surface. The greater the difference between the surface tension of the water and the stones, the bigger the water globule.
