plastic bags, and the wire was in separate coils. Few were marked, so it often took me a while to locate that piece of 26 ga fine sheet I bought last year, especially since I usually take my supplies back and forth to classes. A tip from a friend helped me organize everything. I bought an expanding file folder from the office supplies store (the kind that has 13 slots and a folding cover) and marked the tabs for each gauge of metal I use. Then I marked all my pieces of sheet with their gauge, put them in plastic bags, marked the gauge on the bag, and popped them into the folder. I usually store coils of wire loose in the folder, but they can also be bagged if you prefer. I use one tab for bezel wire and one for the odd, miscellaneous items.

The resulting folder is really convenient when I want to take my metal out to a class or workshop, and it's colorful enough for me to easily find in the clutter of the shop!

Obsidian In The Past and Present by Jan Baumeister

Obsidian is an igneous rock that forms when molten rock material cools so rapidly that atoms are unable to arrange themselves into a crystalline structure. The result is a volcanic glass with a smooth uniform texture that breaks with a conchoidal fracture (see above photo: *in the rough*). Obsidian is usually an extrusive rock, one that solidifies above Earth's surface. However, it can form in a variety of cooling environments such as along edges of a lava flow, a sill or dike, where lava contacts water and lava can cool while airborn! When lava cools off, usually as a result of coming into contact with water, it causes many sharp shards of crystals, which can easily be broken off and used as knives, blades, mirrors and jewelry.

In the United States Obsidian is not found east of the Mississippi River as there is no geologically recent volcanic activity there. In the western US it is found at many locations in Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Washington, and Wyoming. Most obsidian used in the jewelry trade is produced in the US.

Snowflake obsidian is a semi-precious gemstone known for its black background and snowflake-like white spots. Obsidian is made from silicon and oxygen. It is scientifically written as SiO2, most Obsidian is caused by lava cooling off extremely quickly, which is usually the result of obsidian coming into contact with water. The effect is a very glossy sheen and crystals that can be sharp and beautiful. There needs to be a large amount of silica in the environment (this accounts for 70% of obsidian's composition). Lava must cool rapidly, freezing before it has time for crystal growth. Pure obsidian is dark, but impurities usually result in dark green, brown, black, and gray coloring. Other impurities result in stones known as golden obsidian, apache tears, mahogany and rainbow obsidian, ribbon and snowflake obsidian. Blue obsidian has been found at Lassen Creek, CA depth about 6 foot .The crystals found within snowflake obsidian are a type of quartz crystal.

Obsidian is a very useful material and natives in North America, Italy, Armenia, Mexico, South America, Italy, Armenia, Greece, and Scotland and other countries. It is highly valued in ancient times and was often used as points for blades and weapons. Because it is has no crystal structure, obsidian blades can reach molecular thinness, making it a great asset in making to both modern and ancient times. Pliny the Elder wrote about obsidian stone two thousand years ago. It has been mined and used for jewelry and sculptures by many cultures since then. In earlier civilizations, obsidian was highly valued and traded across great distances. It's amazing ability to fracture into sharp edges made it perfect for hunting weapons such as arrowheads, and spear heads. It also came in handy for weapons of war, and used obsidian tools and weapons, both in the "Clovis" (mainly North America) and "Fishtail" (mainly South America) styles. Widely used throughout the western hemisphere and the rest of the world as well) obsidian blades, when freshly struck from the core represent the sharpest cutting edge known, several times sharper than a surgical steel scalpel. In fact obsidian blades are currently in use in some U.S. hospitals for heart bypass surgery. It seems that they cut cleaner, thereby promoting more rapid healing with less scar tissue.

In Oregon, the most well known area having obsidian fields is around Glass Butte. Few people realize that it extends between 40 and 50 square miles and different types of good gem grade obsidian can be found anywhere. One of the early explorers, P.L. Forbes who knew this area as a gem hunter found something unusual in the flow of liquid lava and called it "double flow" in an outcrop at the top of a ridge. Apparently two flows of obsidian came together in almost a straight line, one side flowing black lava and the other side, the lava was bright red and contact made at top of this ridge. When the flows met the obsidian was cool enough so the colors did not intermix, but fused and chilled on contact leaving a sharp line of color demarcation. Two other locations is the Walnut Creek area in northern California and Yellowstone Park, Wyoming. Indians had central meeting places and obsidian was traded for buffalo robe from the Plains Indians. The first piece of obsidian I ever found was lying on the dirt road going into an area of pink limb cast diggings in northern Nevada. I found a previously worked obsidian piece after a backhoe dug out a carport area in a creek bank at end of our property 30 years ago which had to have been traded and transported and in this western area in South Dakota years ago

Working Obsidian by Clarence Bratt

IRIDESCENT - There are two types of iridescent obsidian. In cutting both correctly, the orientation of the color is most important. One type is banded and the color lies in the bands. **On the unbanded type of obsidian**, the surface has to be chipped to find the color. **The banded obsidian** –cut it parallel to the bands to get an eye effect. **To get a rainbow effect,** cut the stone approximately at a 15 degree angle across the bands. The Glass Butte obsidian is banded. **In the Golden Sheen obsidian-** To get the most out of mahogany golden sheen type, saw the bands as if they were stack of plates and you wished to unstuck them. Watch for "fire" spots in the gold sheen. It is not plentiful, but opal-like colors sometimes occur in this type of obsidian. **The Midnight Lace variety-** Lace patterned obsidian should be cut across the surface pattern that you desire to reproduce. *Source: the Ammonite*—4/2014.

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SHOP STUFF

EDITOR'S NOTE: The source of these tips and hints are other club bulletins. Be careful when trying out any new idea. They have not all been tried by this editor.

No-Mar Pliers

Pliers can often leave nicks and scratches on your work. If this is giving you a problem, first take a close look at the plier jaws. New tools can be a little rough. I typically relieve any sharp edges, sand away any tool marks and give working areas a quick polish.

If that doesn't solve the problem, you probably need to cover the jaws. Plastic electrical tape provides a quick fix but can leave messy adhesive on the jaws. Dips don't seem to last very long. A quick and easy way I've found is to slip a length of 1/8 dia vinyl tubing over each jaw. It's quick and leaves no sticky residue. Only problem is that it increases the size of the plier jaws a bit. Tubing can be found in a store that sells aquarium supplies.

HOMEMADE AIR FRESHENERS - Mary Beringer



This project takes a total of five minutes to make, is highly economical, and each jar should last you about a month. This would also make great gifts!

To make these little beauties, you first need heat-proof jars, food coloring colors

of your choice, and essential oil. You can find inexpensive essential oils of various scents at craft stores and some grocery stores. I chose a raspberry scented oil... it smells delightful.

Into each jar, drop a few drops (I repeat...a few...it doesn't take more than 2 or 3) of food coloring. Then, put in about 30 drops of essential oil, give or take. The more essential oil you put in, the stronger the smell.

Now for the fun part. Gather up 4 envelopes of unflavored gelatin, a tablespoon of salt, and 2 cups of cold water. Why salt? Salt (or vodka) apparently will help keep the gel from molding. Interesting fact, isn't it?!?

Get one cup of water boiling on the stove. When it begins to boil, whisk in the gelatin, stirring until it's all dissolved. Then, pour in the other cup of cold water and the salt, stirring until the salt is dissolved.

Quickly pour the hot gelatin mixture in each of your jars, and then use a disposable stick or spoon to stir it into the oil and food coloring.

Let these gel overnight, and then voila! Air freshener!


