#### **SAFETY**

We should all take a few minutes and think about our events concerning rockhounding. Is there something we are doing that is not done in a safe way? Let's talk about campers (RVs). A friend and his wife camped at a local fairgrounds. The weather was cool so they lit the furnace. Unknown to them, the poor protection on the outside vents on motorhomes and campers had let wasps build a large nest inside the vent. When someone checked on them, he had died and she was almost gone.

My brother bought a used motorhome 5 years newer than mine. I walked around the outside of it and told him I saw something I did not like. He took the cover off his vent and found a small wasp nest inside his vent. I had also found a very small wasp nest and two mud daubers nests inside my vent. We now have 1/8 inch screen wire over all of our vents. So, please, if you have a camper or motorhome, take a few minutes and check out your vents and be safe. Investing in some 1/8 inch screen may be the best and safest thing you can do for a longer lifetime.

Remember, be safe, think safe. There is a rock or fossil out there just waiting for you to find.



#### **SHOP STUFF**

EDITOR'S NOTE: The source of these tips and hints are other club bulletins. Be careful when trying out any new idea. They have not all been tried by this editor.

**Use Bondo** (same stuff they fill dents in cars with) when the rock is not slabbed flat and you want to attach the uneven end to a piece of 2x4 block.

When tumbling rocks, you can add desert sand to the first grit in the tumbler. Place plain white rice in with the stones for the last polishing. This will do a wonderful job and the rice will keep the stones from chipping

**Switcheroo:** Need another idea for your extra slabs? Why not try your hand at making some nice agate or marble switch plates to replace those plastic ones you have now?

**To clean and shine most drusy specimens,** use Easy Off oven cleaner (fume free is OK). Spray the specimen and then leave it overnight in a closed container or bag before rinsing. This even works on iron stained quartz crystals.

**Need two cabs of exactly the same size?** Glue two slabs together with paper between them. Cut to size. Separate by soaking in water.

One of the most useful and versatile tools on your workbench should be the orangewood stick. This tool is sold for the purpose of working on cuticles and is available in all cosmetic departments. It is soft enough to not mar gold or silver, yet is hard enough to use as a pushing tool in setting prongs. It will not scratch gems yet reaches into impossible places.

#### **Soapstone (or steatite)**

The Chinese have treasured soapstone for centuries and used it to carve their delicate figurines. The Eskimos use it to make lamps and cooking pots. In ancient Babylon it was used to make signet rings and other items of jewelry. In North America, the early pioneers used it to make laundry tubs; but this is not why it is called soapstone. The mineral gets its name because the waxy polished surface looks and feels like soap.

Soapstone is classified as a metamorphic rock. The original mineral was probably lava, rich in magnesium and silicates fused in the "furnace" of some ancient volcano. The characteristic and usually chief mineral is talc, but which also contains varying parts of chlorite, mica, tremolite, quartz, magnetite, and iron compounds. It is gray to green in color and is notable for its high degree of resistance to acids and heat. It is so soft that it can be easily cut with a knife or other sharp tool, making it a popular material for sculpting. The chief deposits of commercial importance are in the United States, Norway, and Canada. It is now used in the manufacture of laboratory table tops, kitchen sinks, laundry tubs, furnace linings, and electrical apparatus.

- 1. You are part of a group and must do what is best for the group.
- 2. Sign the attendance sheet, it provides needed information in case of emergency.
- 3. If you arrive early, do not go out on your own, unless you clear it with the leader.
- 4. Don't expect to go to the collecting area until the appointed day.
- 5. Let your field trip leader know early if you need a ride to the collecting area.
- 6. If you need fuel or other supplies, inform the leader before leaving.
- 7. When caravanning, always be courteous when using your CB.
- 8. Respect the leaders knowledge of the area when they limit the caravan to certain types of vehicles.
- 9. When caravanning, always maintain adequate space between vehicles to accommodate passing vehicles.
- 10. Jeopardize no one by taking chances, such as climbing steep hills, going into mines, etc.
- 11. Stay with the group, do not go off on your own.
- 12. Let the leader know if you want to leave the group or camp.
- 13. Keep your pets and children under control. Clean up all pet doo doo.
- 14. Don't ever move another persons gear or material so you can dig, unless invited to share the diggings. Tools left in a digging mark another persons claim, even overnight.
- 15. Do not expect to share more material than you helped to dig.
- 16. Don't expect another to carry your rocks. If they offer, consider their load of material first.
- 17. Have a good time and enjoy your hobby.
