Rockhound Roundup News

Roundup dates: March 12-15 Jan Hayes, Chairman

Plans are underway for another outstanding show. If you haven't volunteered at the show before, you would be amazed at the number of activities going on and the amount of coordination and pre-planning required. This is a four-day event! We have 120+ vendors, ongoing auctions, numerous activities for adults and kids and of course, concessions! Geodes will be cut, exhibits on view, and 3 days of field trips provided for the public. Additionally, we will host our second year of the metal detecting contest. An important note to remember: the Rockhound Roundup is our big event for the year and our primary fundraiser. All members are encouraged to volunteer. As you can see there are many opportunities to volunteer in areas that may interest you. The sign-up sheets are located at the club and involve a two-hour block.

This year's Rockhound Roundup field trips have been announced. They will be conducted on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. There will be daily trips to Big Diggings, Fluorite Ridge/Greenleaf mine, and Hatch Barite mine at 8:00 am. All trips will be limited to the first 35 cars or 50 people. The Big Diggins trip fee will be \$20.00 per person ages 8 and up. The other sites will be \$5.00 per person. No restrooms are available. Be prepared to bring water, snacks, lunch, sunscreen, etc. All persons will need to be off the sites by 2:00 pm. Instructions will be given by the field trip leaders the morning of the hunts. Field trip sites are always subject to change depending on weather, road conditions, etc.



**New Mexico** is home to four types of **horny toads**: the Regal and the Texas **horned** lizard, the round-tailed and the mountain short-**horned**. And the Texas and the mountain short-**horned** have a unique protective ability. When they are under attack, they squirt blood from their eyes. They do this by restricting the blood flow leaving the head, thereby increasing blood pressure and rupturing tiny vessels around the eyelids. The blood not only confuses predators, but also tastes foul to canine and feline predators. It appears to have no effect against predatory birds

**Horned lizards** (*Phrynosoma*), also known as **horny toads** or **horntoads**, are a <u>genus</u> of North American <u>lizards</u> and the <u>type genus</u> of the family <u>Phrynosomatidae</u>. The common names refer directly to their flattened, rounded body and blunt snout.

The genus name *Phrynosoma* means "toad-bodied". In common with large true frogs and toads, horned lizards tend to move sluggishly, making them easy to catch; this may also avoid triggering attacks by predators. They are adapted to arid or semi-arid areas. The spines on the lizard's back and sides are made from modified reptile scales which prevent the water loss through the skin, whereas the horns on the head are true horns (i.e. they have a bony core). Of the 22 species of horned lizards, 15 are native to the United States. The largest-bodied and most widely distributed of the US species is the Texas horned lizard.

To avoid being picked up by the head or neck, a horned lizard ducks or elevates its head and orients its cranial horns straight up, or back. If a predator tries to take it by the body, the lizard drives that side of its body down into the ground so the predator cannot easily get its lower jaw underneath

A University of Texas publication notes that horned lizard populations continue to disappear throughout the southwest despite protective legislation. The Texas horned lizard has disappeared from almost half of its geographic range. Population declines are attributed to loss of habitat, human eradication of the ant populations upon which the lizards prey, displacement of native ant populations by invading fire ants (aided by synergistic effects of native ant eradication), and predation by domestic dogs and cats.
