I cannot name a single one.


I pick up rocks where e'er I go, The reason why I do not know, For rocks are found by fools like me Where God intended them to be.

SHOP STUFF

Vinegar, Not Just for Salads

One way to remove carbonates such as calcite from quartz and amethyst is to cover the specimen with fresh vinegar and allow to stand overnight. Repeat if necessary. Wash and then place crystals in washing type ammonia for 8-12 hours. Remove, rinse thoroughly, wipe and air dry.

When using chrome oxide for polishing Jade mix it with a solution of 1/2 water and 1/2 vinegar.


For the gloss finish on tiger-eye, polish once, dry the stone, then put a drop of vinegar on it. Let it stand for a few minutes, then give it a second polish.

If you have sore hands from hard rock mining, soak your hands in warm vinegar water and the swelling and soreness will disappear.

Dark household vinegar will dissolve epoxy glue by soaking overnight.

BEWARE: Carbonate minerals, such as dolomite or calcite are attacked by acids, leaving only a pile of mud where your stone was. Malachite is copper carbonate and is therefore subject to a corrosive effect, caused by even weak acid. If unsure, test with a less valuable piece before using any acid, even vinegar, on a stone.

Rockus Collectralus: A Case Study

It is a horrible thing to be addicted to rocks. In the middle of the night you wake up, contemplating more purchases to make. The shelves in your house are overloaded, sagging under all the weight - 30% of the earth's crust sitting on them. You don't even bother showering any more, as the fine dust left on your hands from carrying rocks has built up to un-manageable levels. All but your best friends have abandoned you; they do not want to be seen in public with someone so dirty.

This is a glimpse into the life of a person affected by Rockus Collectralus, a horrible disease that causes compulsive rock collection. Sufferers of this disease can be easily identified by their bulging pockets, their vest covered in dust, and their beat-up hat. Hints For Surface Collecting

When searching for translucent material, like agate, walk towards the sun, you will see the sun shine through the stone

When looking for reflective material like crystals, have the sun behind you and the material will shine or sparkle in the sun. If you walk sideways to the sun, look side to side for both translucent and reflective material.

If you find something good or unusual, stop and mark the spot, look up the slope and down the slope to find the source of the material. I like to pile rocks every time I find something unusual, that way I can see the fall-line of the material.

Mount Rushmore is carved out of pure granite. Granite is a very hard igneous rock. Igneous rocks are formed when super-hot liquid rock cools and hardens. Granite is famous for its salt-and-pepper appearance, but it can also have a light pink color. If you look very closely, you'll notice that granite contains many tiny reflective minerals – these are usually quartz and feldspar. The granite in Mount Rushmore is particularly strong – it erodes only one inch every 10,000 years. When they started carving Mount Rushmore in 1927, they had to use dynamite because the granite was so hard!
